

A Message from Our Parish Family

We understand that if you have recently experienced the death of a loved one, you may be feeling confused, sad, lonely, or even overwhelmed by your loss. We offer you comfort and a certain hope. It is our Catholic belief that at death, our life is changed, not ended, and that we and our loved ones will find eternal life with God.

As you prepare a Funeral Liturgy or Memorial Mass, we hope that these resources assist you in preparing a liturgy that truly celebrates the great gift of a life that God has given us. If you are preparing a funeral for a loved one who has passed away, please make sure you are in touch with a Funeral Director and our pastor, Fr. Pat Wendt; contact our parish office for help (262-284-4266).

Music in Catholic Funerals

"Sacred music has an integral role in the funeral rites, since it can console and uplift mourners while, at the same time, uniting the assembly in faith and love. (OCF #30) Funeral music should express the Paschal Mystery and the Christian's share in it. (OCF #30) Since music can evoke strong feelings, it should be chosen with care. It should console the participants and 'help to create in them a spirit of hope in Christ's victory over death and in the Christian's share in that victory." (OCF #31)

In the reference notes, OCF refers to the Order of Christian Funerals – 1989

Selecting Music

In a general sense, music that is appropriate for a Catholic Mass is appropriate for a Funeral Liturgy. Recorded music is not permitted during the liturgy; however, if there is a recording that is especially meaningful to the family, we would like to accommodate this. Recorded music can greatly enhance the visitation at the funeral home, or it can be used before the liturgy begins. Once the mass or service has begun, however, recorded music is not appropriate. Family members or other guests who are musicians are welcome to participate in the liturgy. If you would like to include any guest musicians, please discuss this with our Director of Worship and Liturgy.

We have listed suggestions for the various points in the mass below. These are not the only songs that would be appropriate; these are simply suggestions. If you have any questions or would like to include music that is not listed below, please make sure to contact our Director of Worship and Liturgy, Tim Handle, at *Handlet@stjohn23.org* or at 262-284-4266 ext. 1325.

The fee for our Director of Worship and Liturgy is \$175, which includes the initial planning consultation, playing and/or singing for the entire funeral, prelude music, and up to 60 minutes prior to the funeral reserved for rehearsal with outside musicians. Checks are to be made directly to the musician, Timothy Handle. This fee is due no later than the date of the funeral and is often paid direct through the funeral home. If you wish for a soloist to sing (ex. Ave Maria), we have several choir members and cantors available who are happy to sing for an additional fee. I would be happy to contact and arrange for them to sing.
